



# Precongress Workshop

## **About the Workshop**

In this workshop, we will examine how epistemic injustices have excluded LGBT+ individuals from knowledge production, perpetuating scientific biases, the pathologization of non-masculine and non-heterosexual identities, and various structural violences in clinical and institutional settings. Drawing from queer theory, feminisms, and participatory action research, we will explore critical methodologies that not only challenge these biases but also actively engage communities in knowledge construction, transforming research into a key tool for activism and public policies aimed at social justice.

## **Learning Objectives**

- Identify the various ways in which science has reproduced epistemic injustices concerning LGBT+ populations.
- Describe the key principles of critical and participatory methodologies in research with sex-gender dissidences.
- Develop strategies for conducting research that promotes the production of situated and emancipatory knowledge regarding LGBT+ populations.
